

Did You Know? Dispelling Myths & Stereotypes

This month, we are sharing a link to **Indigenous Corporation's Free E-Book** called *Dispelling Myths About Indigenous People*. Here are 2 of 9 that you can learn about and share with staff, students and parents. *Click on the link above for all 9!*

- **Myth: Indigenous People are all the same**
 - **Reality:** One the popular myths is that the Indigenous community is one homogeneous group. This disregards the reality that hundreds of individual Indigenous communities have their own unique history, culture, traditions and economies.
- **Myth: Indigenous Peoples can do whatever they want with their reserve lands and resources**
 - **Reality:** For this myth to be true, all Indigenous Peoples in Canada would live on reserves. In reality, a reserve is a tract of land set aside under the Indian Act and treaty agreements for the exclusive use of an Indian band (First Nation). Métis and Inuit have no reserves. The ultimate title to reserve lands is vested in "Her Majesty."

Every object donated to the *Witness Blanket* tells a story. One by one, they tell us about specific experiences in many times and places. Together, they tell us about the sweeping history of the residential schools that operated from coast to coast for over a hundred years.

Tis' the season - New and old, for toddlers to teens, there's a family-friendly holiday film for everyone on your list.


Film literacy enables an understanding of how film and moving image texts make meaning - we have a few special shout outs for this holiday season for the entire family to enjoy!

Indigenous Education

The Inuit people can't be imagined without their signature parkas, fashioned from fur and hide of the local wildlife. One of the many reasons why early European voyages into the Arctic circle failed is because they were underprepared for the extreme weather conditions of the north. They wore wool clothing, which kept them hot on the inside, but made them sweat a lot, which made their clothing freeze in the extreme temperatures. The Inuit never faced this problem, as they have been making their parkas from caribou deer or seal hide from as early as 22,000 BC (Siberia). The production of these parkas took weeks, and the tradition of making them was passed down from mother to daughter, taking years to master. Depending on the geographical location of the tribes, the design of the parkas varied according to the types of animals available. Beadwork, fringes and pendants frequently decorated the clothing. Roald Amundsen was the first explorer who outfitted his crew with Inuit clothing, which enabled him to successfully circumvent the North-West Passage in 1906. In the 20th century the use of traditional Inuit clothing declined, but it has seen a recent resurgence, as the Inuit strive to preserve their culture.
